15 Ideas for a Book Report

 Use a <u>Venn Diagram</u> to compare/contrast yourself to one of the characters in the book (or compare and contrast two different characters).



- 2. Think of an important scene from the book and create a **diorama** that illustrates this scene. Include a paragraph explaining the event from the book.
- 3. Make up your own <u>quiz</u> for the book. Have at least 25 questions (multiple choice, fill in the blank, short answer, true/false, matching, etc.) Be sure to include the answer key
- 4. Compile a list of 20 <u>vocabulary words</u> you learned from this book. Include the sentence from the book and a short definition. Do not just use words from the glossary.
- 5. Retell the story in the form of a **poem** or series of poems.
- 6. Write an **essay** explaining what things you would like to change about the story.
- 7. Write a <u>letter</u> to the author telling her what parts you enjoyed the most about the story.
- 8. Retell the major plot points of the story in a **comic strip** format.
- 9. Write an essay comparing the book to its **movie version**. If there isn't a movie version yet, write an essay explaining which actors would be great for each of the main parts.
- 10. Make a **collage** (words and pictures) relating to the book and its characters.
- 11. Illustrate a **book jacket** (front & back cover) for the book. Your illustration must be completely different from the actual cover.
- 12. Come up with 5-10 <u>interview questions</u> for one of the characters in the book and then give their answers.
- 13. Make a list of at least **10 important things** that you learned from reading this book. Be sure to explain each one.

- 14. Make a detailed <u>map</u> of the important places in your book. If your book already gives you a map, you cannot use it unless you include specific notes about what happened in certain places.
- 15. Make a <u>PowerPoint</u> Presentation with slides on main character, setting, conflict/solution, theme and at least three other topics of your choice. To save paper, just submit a "handout" printout.

If you have a great idea of your own, please ask if you can use it. All book reports must include the **BIBLIOGRAPHIC** information for the book. See the example:

Author's Last Name, First Name. <u>Title of the Book Underlined</u>. City Where Published: Publishing Company, Date.

These book reports earn you prizes* from the book fair cabinet, so always strive for QUALITY WORK! Neatness, punctuation, and spelling matter. Work that still seems to be in the "rough draft" (sloppy copy) stage will be returned to you to finish. Do not feel bad if you are asked to put more work or detail into a report. You are earning your prizes. Books should be right for your grade level and ability. Submitting a book report when you have not read the ENTIRE book is dishonest. Asking a parent to help you with your book report is a great idea! They might love to help.

- JrK-1: Two good book reports will earn you a free book!
- Grade 2-3: Three good book reports will earn you a free book.
- Grade 4-5: Four good book reports will earn you a free book.
- Middle School: Five good book reports will earn you a free book.
